How is Granby classified and ranked?

- Has a population of 10,347 people.ⁱ
- Ranks 86th in need by Education Cost Sharing (ECS) formula.ⁱⁱ
- Is in District Reference Group (DRG) B.
- Does not have a School Readiness Council.
- Participates in the Discovery Initiative.
- Is not a Priority School District.
- Uses Capitol Region Education Council (CREC) as its regional education service center.

HEALTH AND DEVELOPMENT

THE READY CHILD AT BIRTH: What are the conditions of children and their families at birth in Granby?

- 6 children die before their first birthday in a five-year period (1997-2001).^{iv}
- 9.2 infant deaths occur per 1,000 live births (1997-2001).^v

THE READY COMMUNITY: How adequate are the health and development community resources in Granby?

- 0 children age 1 and 2 are identified with elevated blood lead levels.^{vi}
- 55% of infants and toddlers enrolled in HUSKY A receive 6 or more well-child visits statewide.^{vii}
- 81% of children age 2 to 5 enrolled in HUSKY A have well-child visits statewide.^{viii}
- 30 children under age 3 are referred to the Birth to Three System.^{ix}
- 24 children are served by the Birth to Three System.^x

COMMUNITY PLANNING QUESTIONS: Health and Development

Is there disparity in birth outcomes by race and ethnicity?

Are eligible families enrolling in HUSKY A and B?

Are there effective teen pregnancy prevention programs?

Is there access to and utilization of preventive health care for pregnant women and young children?

Are there smoking cessation and substance abuse treatment services for women of child bearing age?

Are all children under age 2 screened for lead?

Are young children receiving on time well-child visits?

Is care family-centered, comprehensive, culturally competent and addressing physical, social and emotional development?

Are children receiving developmental screening and assessment on the recommended schedule?

Do families use supports like Help Me Grow and Birth to Three to learn about healthy child development and connect to services?

THE READY CHILD IN EARLY CARE AND EDUCATION: What are the learning conditions of children and their families in Granby?

- 4.7% of kindergarten children are in full school day classes.^{xi}
- 20.1 is the average kindergarten class size.^{xii}

COMMUNITY PLANNING QUESTIONS: Early Care and Education

- Do parents know what to expect from their children and the programs that serve them at each age?
- Is there an adequate supply of quality care for each age group to give families good choices?
- Are center-based and family home child care programs accredited?
- Are quality improvement initiatives in place to service providers and families?
- Are there strategies to improve the qualifications of teachers in early care and education?
- Are kindergarten and preschool programming aligned?
- Are there teen parent programs with child care in the high schools?
- Are developmental delays and disabilities detected for the first time in kindergarten and first grade?

PROTECTIVE SERVICES

A SAFE AND NURTURING FAMILY ENVIRONMENT: Are children growing up safe in Granby?

- 3 children (age 0-2) have substantiated reports of child abuse or neglect.^{xiii}
- 2 children (age 3-5) have substantiated reports of child abuse or neglect. ^{xiv}
- 3 children under 3 live in relative or non-relative foster care.^{xv}
- 1 children age 3 to 5 live in relative or non-relative foster care.^{xvi}

COMMUNITY PLANNING QUESTIONS: Protective Services

- Are young children in foster care experiencing multiple placements?
- How quickly does permanency occur for young children?
- Are young children exposed to violence in the home or community?
- Is there a home visiting program for high-risk new families?
- Are families in need of it connected to substance abuse treatment programs?
- Are all children in foster care or protective services assessed and receiving needed health, mental health and developmental services?
